# A Message From Your President Jom Richins

Dear Members.

It was four years ago that I became a fan of our town's local history. The way it happened is that my wife instructed me that we were going to buy an old house and fix it up. It made sense, the house we were then living in was too small, we had just had a baby, and the second was already in planning. As our agent showed us house after house, none of them clicked until she showed

us one on the circle (Grand Boulevard). From the very second we pulled up in the driveway, we knew the 102-year-old house was the right house for us.

As I started to research the history of my house, I found myself at the same time learning about the history of Corona itself. The more I dug in and read, the more I found myself becoming a fan of Corona's earliest pioneers. It is in that light I would like to share one of Corona's earliest moments.

When town founder R.B. Taylor first started our beloved city, he knew that if Corona was going to be successful it had to have an attractive fine hotel. Therefore prime land was donated by the South Riverside Land and Water Company and O.A. Smith put up the money to build and operate it. Construction started July 21, 1887. As construction progressed, it was determined by the workers to hold the first organized religious services in Corona at the half-built hotel itself. To quote early Corona Mayor and historian William Corkhill, "In the midst of the lumber in front of the unfinished building, was held the first church service in the new colony - the pulpit a pile of boards – the pews whatever there might be to sit upon. The Rev. Houlding of the Congregational Society was the preacher."

How inspiring it must have been. Even though Corona was just starting and there were no churches, the construction workers humbled themselves and organized devotional services. From what I have read over the years, almost all of the earliest citizens were the best of people. They lived in a time when morals and ethics were strong. Hard work was a common virtue and prosperity was the reward.

It is not surprising to me that

ten years later R.B. Taylor gathered 100 of Corona's most prominent citizens to the then completed Hotel Temescal to celebrate the success of Corona. Good times were had, friends conversed with friends, but the best moment of the night came when the toast was given by town founder Taylor himself. After reminiscing about Corona's first couple of years, he left his guests, and us, with these words, "When I consider the past growth of Corona, it is something wonderful – a miracle!"

# The Chosts of Christmas Past By Doris Osko

Members of CHPS who attend the annual Holiday Party at Woman's Improvement Club of Corona on December 10th might just find themselves feeling the ghostly presence of a group of women who founded the club in 1899 and some of whom were there when the clubhouse was built in 1913 at 1101 S. Main Street. They might not necessarily be "ghosts of Christmas Past," but their influence is still there in the building which was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1988. In 1898 Miss Helen Platt sent a letter to certain ladies of Corona proposing a meeting to form "A Town Improvement Association of Corona." Twenty-one civic-minded women joined the organization and for fifteen years held meetings in the members' homes. The clubhouse was patterned after a Welsh church, and the site was donated by Mrs. E.L.S. Joy (Ella Louise Skinner Joy) and her daughter, Mrs. W. H. Jameson (Hetty Joy Jameson.)

Helen Platt was one of three sisters who came to Corona – Helen at age 52, Anna at age 54, and Stella at age 47. Stella was the youngest of the eight children of Reverend Adam Wakeman Platt, a Presbyterian minister, and his wife Sarah McAllaster Platt who lived in New York. The three sisters lived together at 156 SE Grand Boulevard which later became 1192 East Grand Boulevard. The house



was originally built for George L. Joy, a founder of Corona. The house no longer stands, but it once stood on the corner of Garretson



and East Grand Boulevard.

Accomplishments of the Platt sisters and the Woman's Improvement Club which it became, included being instrumental in changing the name of the town from "South Riverside" to Corona. They encouraged City

Council to establish a permanent library, a library board, set up the first Humane Society, and supported Woman's Suffrage. When the council would not provide for cleaning the streets used by horses, the women took their brooms and dust pans and did it themselves, shaming their husbands who then created the first Sanitation Department. Stella was a Park Commissioner and was on the Park Board for many years. The sisters were active in the Congregational Church, and Helen was a trustee. Club members planted the pepper trees along Grand Boulevard.

Stella's obituary in 1916 stated, "You may break, you may shatter the vase if you will, but the scent of roses will cling to it still." Helen Platt wrote in the club magazine on February 23, 1909: "Our creed—We believe that work is a privilege, kindness a duty, and worry a crime." Perhaps these words (along with the ghosts?) echo in the venerable halls of the Woman's Improvement Club of Corona's clubhouse. There may also be the scent of roses.

# CHPS Accolades



The Corona Historic Preservation Society is pleased to congratulate our long-time Board Member Paula Muñoz who was named as one of the Distinguished Citizens and honored by the Temescal District of the Boy Scouts of America at the District's Distinguished Citizens Dinner on October 20th. Paula's husband, Tom Muñoz, also serves on the CHPS Board as our current vice president. A donation was made by CHPS to the Boy Scouts Temescal District on behalf of Paula's well-deserved recognition.

On September 16, 2015, CHPS members Jonathan & Kelly Clubb's beautiful Tudor Revival style home, located at 1518 Main Street and built in 1938, was named an official Historic Landmark on Corona's Register of Historic Resources. Not only is this structure architecturally significant but early retail businessman James Emerson (who operated Emerson's Menswear) and his wife Marcella (who managed the Mode O'Day dress store) resided here for many years. This home is now one of over 40 buildings to receive the Historic Landmark designation in the City of Corona.

# CHPS Accomplishments During 2015

**January 16** - Corona High School Marker dedication at the school's third campus on West 10th Street.

**February 21 -** Quarterly Meeting panel discussion "Growing Up in Corona - 1950s" featured six Corona High School graduates from the 1950 decade. This is the link to view a video of this meeting: www.youtube.com/watch?v=PyE 1 kU S0

**March 7 -** CHPS members attended the Riverside County History Symposium at Highland Springs, near Beaumont.

April 20 - CHPS Historic Marker #21 was completed and the granite marker was placed commemorating the site of the last large citrus-related business in Corona, Exchange Lemon Products (1915-1983.) The marker is located off the sidewalk on the east side of Joy Street, north of the railroad tracks. In the latter years, the business was known as Sunkist Growers. Carter Scoggins, of Boy Scout Troop 399, supervised the construction as part of his Eagle Scout project.

**May 2** - Our Vintage Home Tour featured four beautiful historic homes and the First Baptist Church.

June 3 - After the application was submitted by CHPS, the Corona City Council approved the city's Historic District #10. This district constitutes a one-mile segment of the Palisades Drive roadway (State Highway 18 & US91 from 1939-1961) from Wardlow Wash bridge to just east of the intersection of Green River Road. This process took three years.

**June 6** - Participated in the Annual Antiques & Collectibles Faire at Heritage Park & Museum. CHPS provided free lemonade and architectural salvaged items for purchase.

June 20 - Quarterly Meeting visit to W.H. Jameson, Jr. Post 216 American Legion Hall on South Main Street. We had the privilege to experience the ambiance of a bygone era while viewing Civil War, World War I, World War II and Korean War memorabilia.

**In August -** Nine Historic Districts in Corona were identified with signs designed and funded by Corona Historic Preservation Society. This signage was installed by the Corona Maintenance Services Department.

**In September -** President Tom Richins made contact with the granddaughter of noted early Corona architect



Leo Kroonen, Sr. whose architectural creations blessed Corona for many years. Tom was able to digitize the plans/blueprints so that they could be shared with more family members and the community. The originals will be donated to the Corona Public Library's Heritage Room for safekeeping.

**September 19 -** Our Quarterly Meeting was a visit to the Long's Party Garage and surrounding property.

**November 7 -** Historic Site Marker #22 dedication of W.H. Jameson, Jr. Post 216 American Legion Hall at 1024 South Main Street. This plaque is in recognition of Corona's First American Legion Hall, completed in 1929.



### The Passing of an Era

The small but distinctive religious structure built in the Vernacular wood-frame style, with Craftsman elements, located at 823 Sheridan Street, covered several chapters in Corona's religious diversity. It housed Corona's first Free Methodist Church from 1920-1962, Corona's Bible Baptist Church from 1962-1969 and Corona's first synagogue, Temple Beth Shalom, from 1969-2000. It has now been demolished to make room for the expansion of the Corona Regional Medical Center (CRMC) campus. The images below show its appearance at two different points in time. The CRMC has plans to recognize the significance of this site with an historic marker. CHPS was able to facilitate the transfer of architectural salvage (pews and distinctive windows) for future use at Corona Heritage Park & Museum.

We will process any application within 60 days after submittal. Once a grant has been approved and reimbursement limits established, funds will be made available upon completion, inspection and onsite final approval.

Take this opportunity to do some fixing up and have part of the material cost covered by CHPS. Remember we are interested in helping people beautify their homes for others to see, so applications are primarily for curb appeal projects. If you have a place that you feel needs help, either your

the application process.

Our Mission Statement


Through education, persuasion, legislation and organization, CHPS acts as an advocate for the preservation of Corona's historic resources.


